- Personal experiences from Maidenhead
- The hospital my husband stayed at was very uneven with some amazing wards and some in dire need of cash and staff.
- Births of both of my children had well trained staff but far too few of them doing too many disjointed shifts so again, communication was a problem. If myself and my husband were not as assertive as we are we could have had serious problems.
- I have a number of \*non-critical\* conditions for which research receives no funding.
- good but more doctors & nurses need hands on training not at a distance
- The straight of Nurses never having chance to even take a break at times and never being of their feet
- Longer waiting times for doctors to write out prescriptions. Longer waiting times for routine out patient appointments
- No, I am fortunately in good health and have not had to have surgery or other treatment. I am sceptical about how quickly I would receive that treatment should I need it.
- Yes, not enough staff and therefore extremely high waiting time
- Yes, it is all about money. Years ago if you saw a consultant and he couldn't help (as in is it gynae or bowel related) he would refer to the appropriate person but these days he has to write to the GP who then has to start again with a referral letter.
- I was an out-patient last year for a while, but the care was good.
- The turn around time that is needed at the moment hospital beds meant my dad was out quite quick after, 3days.
- Yes...mother stuck in hospital for ages because of lack of support at home. Support was AWFUL once she came home and we ended up paying for care visits privately. Social Care issue but all linked.
- Simply not enough Drs to cope with volume of patients.
- Waiting times too long.
- Personal experience no. But in my professional capacity in education, the failure of services around adolescent mental health are simply too numerous to mention. Moreover, the failure of the government to allocate appropriate resources to child and adolescent mental health services has been well documented. We simply don't have the EHCP funding that is suggested under the 2010 act. Promises, promises but no money to back them up.
- Yes a few months ago I rang for an ambulance to assist with my dear mother who had ovarian cancer and was undergoing chemotherapy and the ambulance just never came! Our predicament was just not as dire as the predicament of others! Again we are fortunate to have access to private health care but still should be able to rely on the ambulance service not being overstretched and underfunded to this degree!!
- Yes more funding on helping people with Diabetes
- Yes, more funding. It was the reason why my wife left nursing at a certain hospital-poor staffing.
- Help with Breast feeding meant I saw the midwife, health visitors and breast feeding counsellors in my local area. I would not have been able to do it without their help.

- It shouldn't even be a discussion. It should be completely non-profit at all levels all services they spend what they need to keep us well & politicians should just find the money NO DISCUSSION!
- Wait times are very long and they don't have enough resources allocated to helping the next generation of medical professionals
- I think the nhs has gone to pot and is getting worse,too many people in the country using and abusing the nhs.my father has been in and out of hospital since July 2016 and every time the experience has been awful
- Bad with mum suffering haemorrhage but less doctors so was seen late
