


5. Push the knotted end with the loop through the hole in the centre of the round card. Sort out the lengths of wool into 4 pairs, 2 pairs of one colour and 2 of the other. Hook the lengths of wool into the slots around the card in this order - 2 lengths of one colour, 2 slots left empty, 2 of the other colour, 2 slots left empty, and so on.





(A. Hold the card in front of you as in this picture. You will be moving the 4 pieces of wool that run from top to bottom of the card.
Move the length of wool marked A from the bottom of the card to the empty slot at the top left of C.
Move the length of wool marked D from the top of the card to the empty slot at the bottom right of B



8. Turn the card until the pieces of wool in the other colour run from the top to the bottom of the card and then imagine you are starting at number 6 again! (it doesn't matter wether you turn the card clockwise or anticlockwise)

Japanese weaving is good for making Friendship Bands, but if you weave longer lengths you could use it for shoe laces, decorative rope lanyards etc.








