Reflections on the weekend Scriptures Wisdom 7:7–11; Psalm 90; Hebrews 4:12–13; Mark 10:17–30

• Throughout most of the Old Testament, material wealth and worldly power were seen as blessings from God. But the author of Wisdom, writing in the century before Christ's birth, puts the spirit of wisdom before these things. After centuries of ups and downs, many realized that wealth and power were transitory. The ability to understand truly and judge rightly, however, was lasting.

• "His face fell, and he went away sad, for he had many possessions" (Mark 10:22). This character in today's Gospel passage is often referred to as a rich man, and that may put some distance between him and us. "Rich" is someone who lives in a mansion, owns a yacht, and has millions of dollars in investments. We're not rich, right? Yes, in fact, we probably are. We are likely richer in material wealth than this man could have ever imagined. Most of us probably have instant and continual access to a world of information and a world of entertainment that was unimaginable even twenty years ago, let alone two thousand years ago. Most of us have nicer homes, better-stocked pantries and refrigerators, more clothes, and better transportation options than this "rich" man. So Jesus' answer is a challenge to us just the same. How do we gain treasure in heaven while living with all the treasures we own?

• Two easily overlooked words in today's Gospel should give us all consolation as we try to reconcile our material wealth with true riches. "Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said to him . . ." (Mark 10:21). It is a tender note Mark adds, saying Jesus loved him. Yes, he gave him an all-but-impossible task, but Jesus sees his goodness in his words and his behavior. Mark wants us to know that despite the disheartening response, Jesus loved him.

Question of the Week

How does my attachment to my possessions keep me from entering the kingdom of God? How might God assist me in making it possible?

The cost of wealth. Our readings reflect a two fisted approach to the material assets we all have, first in seeking our wisdom (in using wealth) and secondly, in the placement of wealthin our relationship with God. It is always to once again remind us that wealth is really nothing other than a blessing received and placed into our hands to achieve the purposes of a loving God who gave it to us in the first place. Practically speaking, wealth is a "vehicle" a "means" to achieving an end....a way to honor God who first provided the breath in your lungs. Yet, we experience just the opposite in life, the endless pursuit of wealth and preservation of wealth and this is where the Gospel hits home hard because the young man did nothing wrong at all and even went beyond the ordinary and sought out perfection, that is, going beyond what God perscribed and when he discovered what this meant, he, as many others throughout society decide to make a fundamental decision: they choose the here and now versus the life to come with God. The good news....we all have a lifetime to change our minds and choose God over things. God bless Fr. Roger
