Reflections on the weekend Scriptures

Acts 6:1-7; Psalm 33; 1 Peter 2:4-9; John 14:1-12

- With comforting realism, Acts presents the early church's very human nature. A dispute breaks out among widows about food. In a way that both comforts and challenges us, the Holy Spirit helps the community resolve its difficulties so that deeper unity develops even as healthy diversity flourishes. Crucial insights for today's Church: 1) The resolution keeps people in rather than driving them out. 2) The diverging perspectives that prompt the dispute prove less important than the common faith that binds the two sides together. 3) The Hebrew-speaking majority (Abraham's heirs) does not dismiss the concerns of the Greek-speaking minority ("outsider" Gentiles). Indeed, 4) the "disgruntled minority" is invited to surface "indigenous leadership," so that the community's structure is modified and its ministry expanded in creative continuity, enhancing both worship and witness. Prayer and the ministry of God's word are not neglected, and Christ continues to be ministered to in the community's needy members.
- Thus the community "incarnates" the insight of the First Letter of Saint Peter: All of us, without exception, are "living stones" with which a unified "spiritual house" is being built (2:5).
- Jesus completes the lesson: "Do not let your hearts be troubled . . . In my Father's house there are many dwelling places" (John 14:1, 2). For the believer, that future begins in the present. Though detoured by unforeseen obstacles and imperiled by inevitable dangers, we are already in the Father's house, the community in which Jesus reveals himself in word, Eucharist, and one another, diverse yet one in Jesus, "the way and the truth and the life" (14:6).

Ouestion of the Week

Drawing on the strength of today's word and Eucharist, how can I offer creativity and understanding as a path toward resolution?
