Reflections on the weekend Scriptures

Acts 2:42-47; Psalm 118; 1 Peter 1:3-; John 20:19-31

- Acts portrays the young community's inner life as the fount from which its public witness springs, the foundation on which its witness stands. Converts who join the community do so not because they have seen the risen Jesus *in persons*, i.e., in disciples transformed by their personal encounter with the risen Christ. That first community's four identifying marks brand us still: "the teaching of the apostles and to the communal life, to the breaking of bread and to the prayers" (Acts 2:42).
- Throughout Easter Time of Year A, we read the First Letter of Saint Peter, an ancient baptismal catechesis. Today's selection echoes Acts, reminding believers of their call: "a new birth to a living hope . . . to an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading" (1 Peter 1:3, 4). The passage anticipates today's Gospel, Thomas' doubting and believing: "Although you have not seen him you love him; even though you do not see him now yet believe in him" (1:8).
- To Acts' marks of the early church that should characterize us still, add forgiveness of sin, including mutual forgiveness and reconciliation with others, even the community's enemies. In the New Covenant sealed in Jesus' blood, they alone are able to become instruments of healing and reconciliation who have had to seek healing and reconciliation themselves. Thus, when the risen Jesus confronts the disciples with the wounds their cowardice helped inflict, Jesus does so not to submerge those disciples (or us) in guilt, as we might confront unfaithful friends; but to transform broken disciples (and us) with a single word, Jesus' first after their denials and desertion: "Peace"—Shalom!

Question of the Week

To whom or to what situation this week can I bring Jesus' healing gift of *shalom* by offering my own forgiveness and reconciliation?

Heating System While we fortunate to have the present system fail at the end of the heating year, it still remains an unexpected expense for this parish and is being corrected at this time. Our present system, originally oil, was converted to gas in 2000. The system failed when the conversion gun broke causing a \$2,500 expense just to replace it. The cost to replace the entire system is \$11,000, less a rebate of \$1,375, or \$9,625 and includes a new separate zone for the basement. Since the furnace is ancient, this seemed the logical time to assume this expense and to proceed with the change. Unfortunately,

even right after Easter, we quite simply do not have this amount of money available and therefore had to withdraw \$7,500 from savings to help pay for this work. Please try to keep pledges current as this will enable us to pay the balance of this expense necessary to modernize our heating system for the future.
