Goroka Workshop

Another intermediate workshop came up at Goroka last month. Work commitments prevented some of the participants from coming, but 6 were able to make it and we had an incredibly good time.

But people here are so intelligent and clued into relationships and communication situations that this project was fascinating. Gonol writes a book

DAVID Gonol's determination to succeed in life and other primary school days' goals after scoring a zero in an English test are being realised. Mr Gonol, 27, from Glaugla tribe in Lower Kagul of Tambul Nebilya District, Western Highlands Province, graduated from the University of PNG in law school in 2009.

He will later this year graduated from the Legal Training Institute (LTI) and is the Deputy Registrar of the National Court in Waigani.

Mr Gonol is not married but said a wife would come to him naturally because it is a blessing from God whom he was serving.

Mr Gonol wrote the book "I've grown to love Jesus" to express how he felt while growing up in a Christian environment.

"I wrote this book to tell the world how I love Jesus and how I am passionate about living the original life of the Creator," said Mr Gonol while launching the book last Saturday.

The book contains poems, guidelines for better Christian life, personal experiences with Christ and encouragement for young Christians.

The copies of the book are now selling in all the Melanesian Christian Book Shop branches throughout PNG for only K4.

Two things that motivated him to write that book were the English language, including reading, writing and speaking and the love for Jesus Christ.

Mr Gonol said although he scored As and Bs in all other subjects, he always score Ds and Fs in English in his early school days and that had caused him to write the book.

He said although his English writing, reading and speaking was poor in those days, he was determined to become a lawyer in the future.

"One day after an English test at the school I scored zero on my test paper. With that zero on my back as burden, I ran straight into the coffee garden and started crying and wailing as I broke down in prayer," he said.

He said it was in his prayers that he made a commitment to write a book and obtain a law degree from a university.

Mr Gonol said it was a challenge he had to endure if he was to write a book in perfect English and become a lawyer.

He said the second motivating factor to write the book was Jesus whom he was passionate about and the life in Him.

The Constitutional Law Reform Commission Secretary Eric Kwa, who is also the author of seven books in law, while congratulating Mr Gonol said Mr Gonol's book was a legacy.

"David will die one day but his book will remain. That is the legacy he will leave behind. I am encouraging young Papua New Guineans to write books," he said. Mr Gonol's relatives, his school mates, friends, the congregation, the pastors and leaders of the church he attends were at hand to congratulate him for the book.
