Reflections on the weekend Scriptures

Isaiah 49:3, 5-6; Psalm 40; 1 Corinthians 1:1-3; John 1:29-34

Today, Isaiah heralds the kind of Messiah John's "Lamb of God" will be. "Servant" appears three times in three lines, suggesting an ideal for us to embrace. This Servant's priority is to bring back, gather, raise up, and restore Israel. But the mission is more expansive: to be "a light to the nations," bearing God's salvation "to the ends of the earth" (Isaiah 49:6). "Sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be holy" (1 Corinthians 1:2), as Paul describes us, we servants of that Servant must consider our corner of the world "the ends of the earth," and plan how to bring "grace and peace" to those we meet who need Jesus' light and warmth.

John's proclamation of Jesus as "the Lamb of God" should trigger memories of contexts saving and nourishing, transcending space and time and opening us to eternity, into which our relationship with Jesus as the Lamb of God has inserted us: the liturgy of the Passover (past) fulfilled in Jesus, the true Paschal Lamb, who offers himself unceasingly in the liturgy of the Eucharist (present), while giving us a foretaste of the heavenly liturgy (future).

Most comforting, Jesus is "the Lamb of God, who takes away the [sin/sins] of the world" (John 1:29). In Gospel passages, "sin" appears in the "collective singular," affirming Jesus' lifting away the whole crushing burden of a fractured world. In liturgical texts, the plural "sins" is often used, inviting us to entrust to Christ's infinite compassion our own personal, multiplied share in the brokenness of the wider world.

To whom and how am I being called to be the servant of God's "raising and restoring" Jesus?
