Turkey Hats

Materials:

Construction Paper: Brown, Orange, Red, Yellow

Tape

Safety Scissors (if your child will be helping to cut)

Turkey Hat Templates



Directions:

Cut brown construction paper into two matching strips to create one long band, that will fit around your child's head. Tape together.

Cut (or help your child to cut out) at least three feathers from the red, yellow and orange construction paper:



You can also fringe the feathers with your scissors if you wish!

Tape these to the inside of the back of the hat band.

Cut out the eyes, beak, and gobbler and adhere to the front of the hat band.

Wear your turkey hat proudly!



Turkeys Have Feathers

Materials:

Construction Paper (any color)

Craft Feathers

Glue



Directions:

Let your child look at pictures of real turkeys (some samples are below). Notice that real turkeys have feathers!

Let your child look at the craft feathers. What do they look like? What colors are they? What do they feel like?

When they are done exploring the feathers, let your child glue them onto a piece of construction paper. (Any way they choose.)

Once the glue is completely dry, display your feathers!

Print out templates.


Cut out (or help your child cut out) the different food items.


Sort them into two groups, things that turkeys eat, and things that only people eat.

Glue the items that turkeys eat onto the paper.



















Where do Turkeys Live?


Crayons or Markers

Have your child color the pictures.





Turkeys Lay Eggs

Materials:

Egg Coloring Sheet

Washable Finger Paint (brown or black)

Old Toothbrush

Water

Directions:

Print out the egg coloring sheet.

Talk about the fact that turkeys are birds, and they lay eggs.

Water down some black and/or brown finger paint with the water.


Take the old toothbrush and show your child how to run their finger over it to create speckles of paint on the paper.

Let your child paint speckles on the coloring sheet to create speckled turkey eggs!

Directions:

Turkeys raised on farms are usually too big to fly. But, wild turkeys can!

Print out the turkey coloring page on card stock (if you are using cardstock.)

Cut out (or help your child to cut out) the turkey.

Have your child color the turkey any way they would like.

Cut a 3 inch portion of straw. Tape to the back of the turkey cut out.

Thread the string through the straw on the back of the turkey.

Take turns sliding the turkey up and down the string. Experiment and find the best ways to make your turkey "fly."

Turkey Counting

Materials:

Turkey and Feather Templates


Clear Contact Paper (optional)

Directions:

Print and cut out turkey and feather templates.

Cover with clear contact paper, if desired.

Help your child to arrange the feathers behind the turkey in numerical order.



Biggest to Littlest Placemat

Materials:

Turkey and Apple Templates

Clear Contact Paper

Construction Paper

Glue or Glue Stick

Safety Scissors (if your child will be cutting)


Directions:

Print and cut out turkey and apple templates (or help your child to cut out).

Glue onto construction paper, putting them in order, biggest to littlest.

Cover with clear contact paper.



Feed the Turkeys

Materials:

Turkey and Apple Templates


Clear Contact Paper (optional)


Directions:

Print and cut out turkey and apple templates.

Cover with clear contact paper, if you would like this to last through more than one or two uses.

Help your child to put the correct number of apples on each turkey.





Memory Game

Materials:

Memory Game Template

Card stock or Construction Paper

Clear Contact Paper (optional)

Directions:

Print out the memory game template. It is best to print it on cardstock. If you do not have card stock, you can print it out and then glue it to construction paper (so you can't see through the cards). If you would like the game to last a bit longer, you can cover it with clear contact paper.


Cut the cards out.

Mix them up, and then place them face down.

Take turns with your child turning over two cards each.

If the pictures on the cards match, that player gets to keep the cards. If they do not match, you turn both cards over, and the next person takes a turn.

Play until you have found all the matches!




Directions:

Turkey Book

Materials:

Book Cover Template

3 or 4 Sheets of Plain Paper

Stapler

Directions:

Print out the template.

Fold in half.

Take 3 or 4 sheets of plain paper and fold in half as well.

Place folded plain paper into the cover.

Staple 3 or four times down the left hand side.

Let your child color the pages in their book. Or if they prefer, they can dictate a story for you to write down.

Safety Scissors (if your child will be cutting)


Directions:

Print out the templates.


Cut out the templates (or help your child to cut them out – they don't have to be perfect, just around the basic shapes)

Let your child put on a play with their stick puppets.














Apple Turkey

Ingredients:

Whole Apple

Toothpicks (rounded not sharp)

Strawberries

Grapes

Dab of peanut butter

2 cheerios or raisins

Directions:

Help your child to wash and dry the apple.

Cut the strawberries and thread several each onto a few toothpicks.

Thread several grapes onto toothpicks.

Stick the toothpicks with fruit on them to the back of the apple to make tail feathers.

Use peanut butter to adhere cheerio or raisin "eyes" to the front of the apple.

Enjoy your turkey!
