Reflections on the weekend Scriptures Deuteronomy 4:1–2, 6–8; Psalm 15; James 1:17–18, 21b–22, 27; Mark 7:1–8, 14–15, 21–23

• We learn more about another person by watching what they do than by listening to what they say. So James is clear in saying that it is not enough to listen to God's word, one must put it into action. "Be doers of the word and not hearers only," he admonishes (James 1:22). Specifically, he encourages the early Christians to care for the most vulnerable among them. This is what he refers to as living out their faith, "pure and undefiled" (James 1:27). Putting faith into action is essential.

• Jesus sees through the Pharisees and the scribes at once, calling them out as hypocrites because they follow the letter of the law and not the spirit. In the previous chapter of Mark, Jesus had sent out the disciples two by two and they preached the word of God, drove out demons, and healed the sick. But they eat with unclean hands, and this is all the Pharisees choose to see. It is easy to judge based on the letter of the law; it takes time and wisdom to judge on the spirit of the law. When we are quick to judgment, we may be making the same error the Pharisees do.

• Moses tells the people that other nations will envy them for observing the commandments because they will conclude that no other nation "has gods so close to it as the LORD, our God, is to us whenever we call" (Deuteronomy 4:7). How fortunate we are, then, that we have a God who is incarnate in the world. How fortunate we are to have a God whom we receive in the Eucharist. How fortunate we are to have a God who moves among us, lives within us, and is revealed to others when we do God's work in the world.

Question of the Week

How can I avoid hypocrisy and embrace the spirit of God's commands? Am I merely fulfilling my Sunday obligation or am I a "doer of the word," putting God's word into action?

required conversion necessary to attain this

Bread which will never leave you hungry and that conversion is not in the externals of our lives, but in the internal elements which mark real change within us. The question for all of us is then, since change (conversion) is necessary, is it worth it to us to make the effort? Do we care enough about attaining this Bread of Life? One place to begin has to be in worship practices. People experiencing genuine conversion show it by worshiping regularly, it is the manner of reinforcement of faith and love for God. Another area to consider is in our sharing with God from the bounty of our lives, that is, our offerings. Adopting a sacrificial stance here and giving from our need and not just our over abundance shows conversion of heart and genuine concern for God and desire to receive the Bread that will fill us forever. There are other things we can also do, but, perhaps these two are a great place to start.
