Goodbye Boots

A lot of you will know Boots' Story from our website, Facebook page and our last edition of The Greys Matter. For those of you who do not know, Boots' had an injury to his hip as a puppy that was never treated, so for two years he walked around with a dislocated hip that must have been very painful.



RIP brave Boots (31/05/13)

Recently Boots underwent hip surgery and was recovering slowly from that. He went for his usual physiotherapy session where he walked on a conveyor belt in water, the session finished early as he did not seem himself. Moments later he was obviously in great pain and we rushed him to the nearest vet which was The Sydney University. An MRI showed fluid along the spine which was first thought to be an infection but may have been blood. The pressure from this fluid was affecting the nerves controlling Boots' back legs and he had lost the use of them within 10 minutes of the onset.

Despite every effort from the vets the paralysis was fast approaching Boots' lungs and we had no option but say goodbye to him.

Greyhounds are gentle and affectionate animals that make excellent family pets and Boots was a prime example of this. He lived with other greyhounds and little dogs and despite his problems he loved his walks and would literally bounce up and down when it was time to go out. He lived life to the full and even in his last few days was stoic to the end.

We would like to thank everyone who supported Boots' operation, recovery and final days. Rest in Peace Boots, you will never be forgotten.

Sponsoring a hound couldn't be simpler. A dog can be selected from the Greyhound Rescue website, underneath their names you will see 'Sponsor Me'. Choose a hound and decide on an amount per month or fortnight, which can be as little or as much as you are comfortable with. When you join the programme we send you a sponsor pack consisting of a Greyhound Rescue sticker, a copy of The Greys Matter and a photo of your sponsor dog.

After receiving the pack Verity will keep you up to date with how your dog is going. For example, if they have been out on a walk, been to the vets etc. Verity will also try to take pictures regularly and email them to you so you can keep up-to-date. Once your dog gets adopted you choose another dog to sponsor. You will then receive a photo of that dog!

Big Is Beautiful

Teter said to me not long ago someone needed to write an article on "big is beautiful" about the gorgeous greyhounds waiting patiently for their forever home. Bob definitely falls into this category. He also falls into the "big and black is beautiful" category too, the black dogs never seem to get homed easily. Us humans do a great disservice to these beautiful dogs when we only look with our eyes. We decide that the dog is too big/too small, not the right colour, or their ears sit funny, or a host of other things we have on our mental checklist. We all do it, subconsciously or not - the trick is to move past all that to find the dog of your dreams. Some really great dogs with amazing personalities miss out, and that's so sad. What everyone needs is a dog that fits in with their family, whatever they look like. Our lady grey Miss Poppy is black with a very grey muzzle, a broken tooth and a missing toe. But she has the most wonderful sweet and loving personality and we love her all the more for her "imperfections". In any case I think the black ones are just gorgeous - with a bit of TLC to get rid of



a kennel coat, and some sardines or eggs in their breakfast their coats get beautifully glossy (they can also wear any colour collar or neckerchief to advantage too!)

I first met Bob when Peter brought him to me to take home as a foster kid. My first thought was "whoa! Big boy!" My own boy Twiggy is not very big. I can see why people dismiss the big boys as they can look a bit daunting at first. But you know what – you get used to their size, it's no problem. According to Bob, size is a state of mind.

Bob, like many big dogs, fails to understand he is in fact, a large individual (just like many Chihuahuas that I imagine look in the mirror and see a Great Dane). It's hilarious watching him try to squish into the tiniest bit of space left on the sofa just so he can get near you for a cuddle (it's usually two humans and three greyhounds to a couch these days). There was a baby that would not stop crying on the TV the other night, and Bob decided it needed

investigating. Try as he might, he could not work out where the baby was! He tried to get behind the TV, and underneath the cabinet but with no success (again, his brain doesn't compute he is just too big to fit in those spaces). Any of the animals that I have ever lived with that are scared during thunderstorms try to get under something to hide. Not Bob. During the recent storms he decided to take "shelter" by hopping up on my armchair which could not fit him however much he tried. One of the advantages of having a big greyhound is that you never have to bend down to pat them or pick them up, they are always at the perfect height! Because greyhounds should have their dinner and water bowls elevated to prevent bloat, this is a bonus for anyone with a back problem! Add to that the fact greyhounds don't need a lot of exercise, they are a greyt choice for people who can't do a lot of walking or running around. And they LOVE people. Bob's very good at listening out for his foster Dad coming home, and if I've been out he is always part of the greyhound greeting party that does happy dances along the fence. He always comes to say good morning, and his favourite trick is to put his front paws up on the bed, and bury his snout under the doona to find me and give some gentle love nibbles.

Bob like any of the greyhounds I've met loves company. He makes a great hot water bottle on a cold rainy evening curled up on the couch with his head on your lap. He is happy just to lie like a sphinx in

the kitchen doorway and watch me while I cook dinner, or lie at my feet while I'm sewing or working on the computer. He's happy to come and supervise any washing to be hung out, or any weeding that needs to be done. I think he fancies himself as guard dog. Except as a guard dog he's likely to jump for joy rather than bark at you as the courier found out. As a big dog he can look a bit intimidating to visitors, but sometimes that's not a bad thing. I had a couple of people come door knocking the other day who I really didn't have time for - but when the greyhound meet and greet party arrived they made a hasty retreat. I wasn't going to tell them they had nothing to worry about, but when the secret gets out, I guess greyhounds won't be as good a deterrent! I never worry about taking the dogs for a walk on my own when it gets dark either, with a big dog at your side I don't think people will want to mess with you. Bob is also quite a gentleman on the lead, and doesn't pull. Unusually for a boy, he also doesn't feel the need to mark every lamp post, electricity pole or fence along the way!

Millie's Story

Nora and I picked up Millie on the 21st of April to foster, and boy, how our life has changed! Many of you know Millie the greyhound puppy who lost her toes and pads and was left with a little stump. Still to this day, we are unsure why and how it happened but all we know is that it was not a proper vet amputation and Millie was picked up with no antibiotics or painkillers...Go figure!

We had just said goodbye to Angel, our first foster puppy and was not expecting another puppy to foster so quickly! But, the foster puppies move quickly so we were happy to take Millie on for a few weeks. That was before we realized the extent of her 'injury'.

Mosman Vets, who support and have raised over \$5000 in the past years, saw to Millie straight away. It was looking grim, like a whole leg amputation was the only option. As I held tiny Millie, I fought back tears. Millie used that paw, she ran around on it with a thick bandage on. She boxed her doggie friends and bashed at the door when she needed a wee. We knew that dogs do well on 3 legs, but we wanted another option. Thankfully, her vet Dr Abbie Tipler, was thinking the same thing. Abbie researched and found Dogs In Motion, the Australian Distributor for OrthoPets who are the industry leader in orthotics and prosthetics for animals.

Michelle from Dogs In Motion and Abbie, worked together to work on a prosthetic for Millie so amputation was no longer an option. Greyhound Rescue raised a tremendous amount of money to cover her costs (if you donated/shared, we thank you from the bottom of our hearts!!!) Nora took Millie to physio rehab with Bec at the Animal Rehab Centre in Narabeen every week whilst I took her to her bandage changes at Mosman Vets, which was becoming almost her second home! On the 20th of August, her prosthetic arrived. Michelle travelled from QLD to help with the fitting at Mosman Vets. It was a very emotional day, watching Millie walk instantly on her prosthetic as if she had it all that time. Since then, she has been in the water for the first time and gone from walking slowly on the lead to absolutely belting it in the park! All down to her amazing team at Mosman Vets, especially Abbie, to Bec her physio and Michelle from Dogs In Motion – thank you all.

There have been ups and downs the whole way; working with a few blisters that wouldn't go away,



the drives to all her vet trips and physio rehab etc. But Nora and I, we wouldn't change it for the world. Millie has taught us, quite simply, "be happy!" Millie always has a smile on her face, she has taken life on with no fear and no anger. How can you stress over your first world problems, when Millie's smiling face is saying, "Mum, Dad...don't worry, be happy!" (Did we just write, Mum and Dad? Whoops, guess the cat is out of the bag...Yes! We adopted her!)

The greyhound is one of the most unique breeds of dog in the world. Greyhounds are noted for their elegant appearance, grace, gentleness, patience and sensitivity.

The streamlined body of the greyhound is that of the ultimate canine athlete. The sight and silhouette of a greyhound running at full speed, muscles contracted, tail and legs stretched is a rare beauty in comparison to the rest of the canine world. His ability to reach top speed quickly is amazing. At maximum acceleration a greyhound can reach a speed of 45 mph within his first 6 strides from a standing start. No other land animal has that degree of acceleration, except the cheetah.

The greyhound's historical lineage dates back over 4,000 years ago, making the greyhound the oldest purebred canine still in existence. These animals are referenced in various ancient cultures over the centuries. For example, Greyhounds are represented in the sculptures of Persepolis, depicted with rich and stately trappings.

Vegan Hounds

Recently my greyhound Bear's litter brother died from bone cancer. As soon as I heard I started to research the subject to find out the likelihood of it being hereditary. It turns out this isn't likely but more likely caused by diet, resulting in a weakened immune system. This is an area that is relatively unstudied with mainly anecdotal evidence. But this really sparked my interest in discovering more about their diet. So what diet, vegan?

The whole subject of feeding your faithful hound on a vegan diet can be a controversial one. When you think of a dog, you naturally think carnivore but dogs are actually omnivorous. This means their diet can include both animal and vegetable tissue. Various veterinarian experts believe it is more important to ensure your companion animal is getting the right nutrients, whether that be through meat or an alternate source.

Armaiti May, DVM (Doctor of Veterinary Medicine) highlights some interesting health benefits for dogs:

- Skin problems are often caused by allergies, commonly beef, chicken and milk
- Healthy slimmer, many obese dogs. Naturally high fiber diet means they naturally lose weight.
- Not exposed to the '4D' meat. Dead, dying, disabled and diseased meat. In some cases in America BSE (Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy) infected animals are used for pet food. When you see 'By Product' on the ingredients label this could mean spinal cord, diseased lesions, etc. none of which would be fit for human consumption.
- Reduced risk of degenerative diseases such as cancer, heart disease, kidney disease and arthritis.

According to Dr. May with allergies relating to diet the benefits of changing to a vegan only diet could take eight to twelve weeks. Over the first two weeks it should be a gradual transition.

Diet is obviously important yet so often we just get the cheapest food from the supermarket. What makes one brand of dog food or kibble different from another?

We try to give our hounds a balanced diet which includes a little fruit, veg, rice, pasta and kibble. But is that a good diet? I don't really know. I do know that if I crack a banana, Bear can hear it 10 meters away through any amount of background noise. He comes, running, drooling, hoping I will share.

Feeling inspired and wanting to understand more I got in touch with Jodie Cherry, a strong vegan

advocate, which she bestows on her greyhounds. If you know her you will know that her greyhounds clearly have the best life in the world and are clearly very healthy. And I was interested in how she achieve this.

"I'm really flattered that you would ask me to write for the newsletter but I'm not sure if I'm willing to put myself under attack from all those who are dead against vegan diets for dogs. I might be labelled as irresponsible and cruel by many. It took me a long time to come to a position where I was ready to feed the girls a vegan diet. Maple didn't start out as a pup on vegan food but I didn't feel good about feeding her vet dry food (which is all my vet said she needed!) I Initially fed the girls dry biscuits, steamed brown rice, veg, brewers yeast and raw chicken mince (as a vegan I felt that this was the lowest impact on farmed animals because it was the body parts humans didn't eat) but I was concerned about the mutant chickens being farmed for humans and what disease they might have had prior to death. I felt that people who farm and kill animals for a living can't be trusted. When I first adopted Phoebe I had read in a blog somewhere of a vegan woman in Adelaide that had vegan greyhounds and this fascinated me as I did believe that as the world's fastest hunting dogs their nutritional requirements might be different from a Labrador which we all know are pretty much happy to eat anything and everything. I read lots on online blogs and links which was my proof of many vegan dogs around the world that appeared to be happy and thriving on a vegan diet. As much as I would have liked to consult a vet I knew that unless the vet was vegan they would not be supportive of a vegan diet so that would be a pointless exercise. I also did eventually become FB friends with the vegan

woman in Adelaide who confirmed she had fed her two rescue greyhounds on a vegan diet for approximately 12 years."

I was very surprised that Jodie thought she would be attacked, especially given that so many animal welfare advocates are vegan. Not everyone may agree but that doesn't make it wrong.

Given her vegan life style it must make it easy to extend to her companion animals. That won't be the same for everyone but potential 'food for thought' for others in a similar position.

"I'm definitely not claiming to be an expert in vegan dog diets. I transitioned them after the chicken mince to sardines and rice etc. before vegan. But I have to say when they ate a meat diet they did farts from hell. It's funny how their meat diet caused digestion problems. I thought a plant diet would cause problems, now they rarely fart and if they do it doesn't stink. weird!!!"

So what would be a typical diet for them?

"Breakfast: Wholemeal toast with natural peanut butter (from healthfood shop), followed by bananas from the banana farm. Sometimes a banana smoothie of bananas, water, carob powder and wheatgerm.

Dinner: Well steamed brown rice, red and yellow lentils, Nutrela (non-GMO soy protein chunks) in gluten free gravy, steamed sweet potato or pumpkin, pasta, BioPet vegan dog biscuits, avocado or a dash of olive oil. Supplements: flaxmeal, brewers yeast, seaweed powder, taurine and sometimes L-Carnitine.

Supper: every night the girls 'hound' me until they get a vegan veggie ear. I buy these in bulk each month, 75 in a box for \$120 plus postage, not cheap but they love them. They also like organic medjool dates as a treat."





"What people don't know is many commercial dog foods have TVP (textured vegetable protein) to make up the chunks with whatever other animal slop is in the mix. The Nutrela is higher in protein than meat and that combined with two types of cooked lentils meets their protein requirements. Also I believe that those who feed their dogs on a predominantly chicken based diet may also be lacking Taurine as from what I read it's found in red meats. I supplement the girl's diet with synthetic Taurine."

Dr May also talks about the need to supplement Taurine for large dogs. Supplementing a dog's diet with Taurine need to be done carefully as too much is as harmful as too little.

So given the right research and ensuring your greyhound has a healthy and balanced vegan diet with the necessary supplements there are some very tangible benefits. There are plenty of resources available on this subject and many people willing to share their experiences. Jodie's greyhounds' vegan diet is certainly not the most economical way to feed your pet but you are in control of the quality of the food they are given. It looks complicated and time consuming, but it is a lot simple than you might think. It's based on the five step guide which is 1/2 protein, 1/4 grain, 1/4 veggies + Taurine Ammino + extras. For those who want to embrace this diet their is a easy read PDF 'Vegan Canine Diet: A Good Place To Start' by Nicole Gabriel and a book you can get shipped from the US for ~\$20 AUS inc. P&P 'Vegetarian Dogs' http://vegetariandogs.com/.

For those that don't have that time there are vegan kibble alternative available from good pet stores.
