# Reflections on the weekend Scriptures

Genesis 22:1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18; Psalm 116 Romans 8:31b-34; Mark 9:2-10

The story of Abraham nearly sacrificing his only child is a difficult one to hear or to appreciate. It helps to understand that this story is told to show how faithful and obedient Abraham is. "God put Abraham to the test" and Abraham passes (Genesis 22:1). He places his trust in God without knowing why he is being asked to do this or how God's promise to him of innumerable descendants can still be kept. It also helps to connect this story of Abraham and Isaac with the fact that the Father allowed his own Son to suffer and die in order to effect our salvation. Like Abraham, Jesus trusts in God and obeys God's will.

In the Gospel Jesus is transfigured and appears in glory with Elijah and Moses to his inner circle of disciples—Peter, James, and John. It could have impressed and encouraged them, but instead they are terrified and later confused after Jesus tells them that he will rise from the dead. Like Abraham, they are not prepared for what they see and what they are told. In the previous chapter of Mark's Gospel, Peter rebuked Jesus when Jesus first told his disciples would suffer, die, and then rise in three days. At this point, Peter is unable to understand or accept what Jesus reveals to him.

Strong in faith or weak in faith, God has a special place for all. Abraham was strong in faith, the very model of trust in God. He obeyed God even in extreme circumstances, willing to sacrifice his own son if this is what God demanded. Peter, on the other hand, repeatedly comes up short in the Gospels. Questioning on the mountain, sleeping in Gethsemane, denying in Jerusalem, and doubting when trying to walk on water, Peter's faith is often weak. Yet Jesus chooses Peter to lead the church, as God chose Abraham and his descendants to inherit the land.

#### **Question of the Week**

In the Gospel, God says, "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him" (Mark 9:7). What is Jesus saying to me? What is Jesus asking me to do?
