Reflections on the weekend Scriptures Isaiah 50:4c–9a; Psalm 116; James 2:14–18; Mark 8:27–35

• "The Lord GOD is my help," Isaiah says twice in today's first reading (Isaiah 50:7, 9). But in what way? Isaiah does not turn to God in this passage for help in defeating his enemies. Nor does he look to God to help put an end to his suffering. He "sets (his) face like flint" to accept it. No, Isaiah looks to God in confidence that he is doing God's will. He knows that he is in the right because he is doing the will of God. He looks to God for strength to endure the abuse he receives, knowing that his sacrifice is worth it.

• This is the same basic passage from Isaiah that we hear every year on Palm Sunday. It is easy to see why it would be paired with a reading of the Passion, as Isaiah is Christ-like in the way that he accepts the abuse he receives from those who oppose God's will. But this passage prepares us for *this* Gospel as well, as Jesus is preparing his disciples for his death. That does not go well, as it ends with Jesus reprimanding Peter, "Get behind me, Satan" (Mark 8:33).

• Peter had just identified Jesus as the Christ (the Messiah, in Hebrew). However, Jesus knows that he is not the kind of Messiah that everyone expects, one who would lead the people to victory over the Roman government. Instead, he is the Messiah that Isaiah describes in the first reading. He is the one who will suffer on behalf of the people. He will be the one who will need to resist the temptation to let this cup pass. No wonder he refers to Peter as Satan. Peter's way of thinking is a temptation like Satan's was in the desert.

Question of the Week

How am I denying myself? What is the cross I am bearing at this point in my life? With the grace of God, am I willing to carry it?

There are opportunities to assist at Amos house in Providence on a few Saturday mornings coming up. The service time required is 9am to 1pm.


