# Reflections on the weekend Scriptures

Acts 3:13-15, 17-19; Psalm 4; 1 John 2:1-5a; Luke 24:35-48

Even though we do not hear any readings from the Old Testament during Easter, in a way we do hear what is written there. Both the first reading and the Gospel proclaim that God has brought the words of the prophets to fulfillment in the person of Jesus. Peter explained that the Messiah suffered just as the prophets had said he would. Jesus tells his disciples that everything written about him had to be fulfilled, including his suffering, death, and resurrection.

Another commonality between Peter's and Jesus' speeches is that they called their audiences "witnesses." Obviously, they were, as these people had seen Jesus before his passion, had seen him crucified, and at least some had seen him firsthand after he had risen. But how can we be witnesses? How can we "who have not seen and have believed," as we heard last week, witness to what the early church had seen? It may be helpful to note that the early Christians had never met Abraham or Moses or Isaiah, yet they knew them intimately through scripture and preaching. So too do we learn about Jesus. But more than that, we know that Jesus is with us always, so we can always witness to him.

A final constant of today's readings is repentance. Why is repentance emphasized so strongly today, when the penitential season of Lent has ended? Perhaps because sin has not. As sinners, we are always called to repentance. Fortunately, as John says in his letter, Jesus is expiation for our sins and the sins of the whole world. Repent, and our sins may be wiped away.

### Question of the Week

How can I be a witness? How do I explain what the presence of Jesus in my life means?
