Reflections on the weekend Scriptures Amos 7:12–15; Psalm 85; Ephesians 1:3–14; Mark 6:7–13

When Amos is banished from Bethel for his prophesying, he responds, "I was no prophet . . . I was a shepherd and a dresser of sycamores" (Amos 7:14). Like Jesus' disciples centuries later, Amos did not study to be a priest or a prophet. He was called by God from his chosen profession. He cared for sheep and also for the fig-like fruit of the sycamore tree, which had to be pierced to allow it to ripen fully. Perhaps in his new role he needed to pierce the corruption of the rulers in order to let the kingdom of God blossom.

Jesus sent out the disciples two by two, which certainly made traveling easier and safer. It is interesting to speculate about how they were paired off. Perhaps Peter, impetuous and outspoken, was sent with Thomas, unsure of what he did not see himself. Maybe Andrew, the fisherman, traveled with Matthew, the tax collector. Who might have been paired with Judas? Yet despite the differing personalities and backgrounds and attitudes, they were all able to do the work of the Lord.

Jesus' disciples could not bring much at all on their mission, but still they were able to attract followers, drive out demons, and cure many who were sick. They could only take a walking stick, their sandals, and the clothes on their back, but that is not all they had. They had authority over unclean spirits. They had the model of Jesus, whom they had witnessed accomplishing these things. They assuredly had the Lord's guidance. God provided all they needed; anything more would just have been unnecessary and distracting.

When I feel ill-equipped for the journey, do I trust that God will provide what I need?

life's sorrows as well. There is one thing which has been a disappointment to me over the years and that has been the slow "doing away" of the Sacrament of the Sick. Our Gospel touches on anointing and healing this weekend and I want to write to reinforce the importance of being anointed whenever you are facing serious illness, are in advanced age and at any time when God's presence is important to your healing process and can make a difference. Yet, so few approach for the sacrament at church and I do not receive many requests for it at home as well and this is a shame. Integral to the sacrament is prayer for God's intercession and also the forgiveness of sin....both of which are important or should be important to anyone facing a difficult illness and perhaps the uncertainly of a favorable outcome. Why is this? I think it is part of the secular concerns of our life. We are concerned with treatment, medications and therapies, but tend to leave religious treatment out of thought and this is not a good thing. Will an anointing relieve pain? Probably not, but it will release a burden we place on ourselves and open ourselves to God's healing presence in our lives, and this is important and in cases where the outcome is uncertain, can make a difference....food for thought. Musical "Notes" from Justin In England, before World War II, certain hymns (especially "Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken") were sung to the same melody as the German national anthem ("Deutschland, Deutschland über alles"). During the war, however, people in England objected to this tune, due to its German association. Cyril V. Taylor composed the new tune ABBOTS LEIGH as a replacement. Nowadays, this tune is most often used with the words "Lord, You Give the Great Commission" (written by Jeffery Rowthorn in 1978).
