USS BELKNAP is the first of an advanced class of nine guided missile frigates and the second ship of the United States fleet to bear the BELKNAP name. Named for Rear Admiral George Eugene BELKNAP, U.S. Navy (1832 -1903) and his son, Rear Admiral Reginald Rowan BELKNAP, U.S. Navy (1871 - 1959), her keel was laid on 3 February 1962 at the Bath Iron Works Corporation, Bath, Maine. She was faunched into the Kennebec River on 20 July 1963, the traditional bottle of champagne being smashed across her bow by Mrs. A.C.J. Sabalot, the granddaughter and daughter of the Rear Admirals BELKNAP. BELKNAP was commissioned on 7 November 1964 at the Boston Naval Shipyard with Captain John T. Law, U.S. Navy, assuming command,

Since her commissioning in 1964 it has been the desire of the officers and crew of BELKNAP to maintain her at the highest state of readiness possible. Only through their constant preparation can she meet her goal of defense of the free world and control of the seas. BELKNAP's history has reflected the desires of her men and proven her capable of taking a vital role in the defense of the United States and her allies.


As with any ship, BELKNAP's first assignment was to train the men who would sail and light her. A great deal of this training was accomplished at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, besigning in February 1966, At the completion of her training period BELKNAP joined the United States SECOND Fleet.

BELKNAP had completed her formal training period, however, training never really stopped. Each exercise the ship conducted was designed to train the crew and improve the readiness of the ship. Her history shows an unending cycle of guided missile, anti-submarine warfare and gunnery exercises designed to train, test and improve her capabilities.

BELKNAP's history has not been all preparation. Twice she has served in the combat environment of the Tonkin Gulf. It was during the fall and winter of 1967 and 1969 that BELKNAP was involved in operations with the SEVENTH Fleet in the Western Pacific.

BELKNAP has also been called on in the Mediterranean Sea to meet the crises of the Jordanian Civil War. Her deployment to the Mediterranean in September of 1970 was an emergency for which she had no advance notice. During the Middle East Crisis of October 1973 BELKNAP was once again involved in special operations with the U.S. SIXTH Fleet, By being always prepared she was able to meet her commitments.

BELKNAP's future can not be forseen but without a doubt her life as a fighting ship will follow the pattern set by all of the destroyers to go before her. That is, constant preparation of her men and the tools and weapons at their disposal in order that she may defend her country, its interests abroad and the freedom of the seas for all the nations of the world.

CAPTAIN WALTER R. SHAFER, USN

Captain Walter R. Shafer, USN, is a native of Troy, Ohio. He received his commission upon graduation as a Regular NROTC Student at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio in June 1950.

During the Korean Conflict he saw action on board USS PHILIP (DDE-498) where he served in the Operations, Weapons and Engineering Departments. His subsequent sea duty has been: Commissioning Detail and Weapons Department, USS MITSCHER (DL-2); Establishing Detail and Operations Officer, the Staff of Commander Escort Squadron SEVEN, the surface portion of the Pacific Barrier; Commanding Officer, USS POLK COUNTY (MST-1084); Commanding Officer, USS ADROIT (MSO-509); Commissioning Detail and Executive Officer, USS BELKNAP (DLG-26); and Commanding Officer, USS CONYNGHAM (DDG-17).

Ashore, Captain Shafer has served as Assistant Professor of Naval Science at the University of Michigan; as a student in Ordnance Engineering at the U.S. Naval Post Graduate School, Monterey, California; and as Advanced Weapons Officer of the U.S. Navy Section, Military Assistance Advisory Group, working with the Italian Navy in Rome, Italy. He returns to BELKNAP from a tour as Point Defense Weapon Systems Manager at the Naval Ordnance Systems Command Headquarters, Washington, D.C.

Captain Shafer is married to the former Joanne DuBois of Highland, Indiana. They have three sons, Richard, John and Robert; and, one daughter, Elizabeth Ann.
