<b>What you said</b>	The response addresses the two main components directly (property division and property layout). Your writing communicates that you laid out the property with purpose and gives the reader a clear sense of why you made the decisions you did. (4)	The response addresses the two main components (property division and property layout). Your writing explains parts of your process, but the reader is left with an unclear understanding of your vision for the entire property or for major components. (3)	The response does not address one or both of the main components (property division and property layout). You explain parts of your process, but the reader is left with an incomplete picture of why you made the layout decisions you did. (2)	The response minimally addresses the main components (property division and property layout). There is very little explanation of why you made the layout decisions you did. (1)
<b>How you said it</b>	The response uses clear and specific language, follows appropriate grammar and punctuation rules, and gets to the point. The precision of your writing communicates your ideas clearly and economically (without unnecessary “fluff”). (4)	The response is mostly clear but grammar and punctuation mistakes or unclear and imprecise language detracts from the readers understanding. (3)	The response is somewhat clear but could be significantly improved with attention to grammar, punctuation, and the use of more clear and precise language. Your design ideas are incompletely communicated by your language. (2)	The response is filled with mistakes (grammar, punctuation, and spelling) and unclear language. The mistakes and lack of clarity make it very difficult to understand your explanation. (1)
