
Timeline of all the preparation and swift response to flooding

If you're feeling a bit of deja vu about David Cameron's statements regarding the Somerset floods, you're not alone

The Prime Minister has returned to London this afternoon to hold a press conference and tell the media what he has learned from his tour of the floods in Somerset.

It's not the first time he's "learned" things from flood visits.

On 18 December 2009, six months before he became Prime Minister, Cameron visited the town of Dumfries which had been hit by flooding, killing a police officer. He had this to say:

"I wanted to come... to understand what lessons should be learned not only for Dumfries and Galloway but also for other parts of the country."

Four years after become Prime Minister, he's still talking about these "lessons."

From 7 February 2014:

"There are lessons to learn... but right now the priority is that everyone in Somerset who needs help is getting help."


And **from today** 11th February 2014:

"...everybody needs... to learn all the lessons of the very difficult situation we're in. That's what everyone needs to do, that's what's going to happen in the days and weeks ahead."

It's hard to see what lessons Cameron has learned, because soon after he became Prime Minister, he oversaw huge cuts to Defra's budget as part of the coalition's austerity agenda.

Maybe he should take some maths lessons too.


